## WERA-IRN EXTENDED EDUCATION 2019 Conference: Extended Education – Practice, Theories and Activities

Invited Symposium at the WERA Focal Meeting, August 5-8, 2019 in Tokyo, Japan: *Quality in Extended Education: Quality Concepts, Approaches to Measurement and Continuous Quality Improvement* 

As an IRN, we have been invited to hold a symposium at the WERA Focal Meeting in Tokyo. There, we will present recent research findings that show that the quality of extended education programs has a significant influence on their outcomes. Hence, many countries have made efforts to measure and to improve the educational quality.

In the symposium, three papers from three continents and countries – Japan, Switzerland, and the United States – examine the quality of extended education, especially concerning quality concepts, approaches to measurement, and continuous quality improvement.

The first paper presented by Prof. Fuyuko Kanefuji, Bunkyo University, Japan, aims to explicate the concepts of quality for afterschool programs in Japan. The contribution on allday schools in Switzerland will be presented by Prof. Marianne Schuepbach, Dr. Benjamin von Allmen M.Sc., Dr. Lukas Frei M.Sc. and Dr. Wim Nieuwenboom, Freie Universität Berlin, Germany. This paper explores different aspects of process quality based on a standardized observation instrument regarding socio-emotional development and school achievement. The third paper, entitled "Improving STEM Quality and Learning," focuses on developing systems and state afterschool networks across the United States and will be presented by Prof. Gil Noam and Dr. Patricia Allen.

All papers will be examined and discussed by Prof. Ludwig Stecher, University of Giessen, Germany, and Prof. Sang Hoon Bae, Sungkyunkwan University, South Korea from an outside perspective.

The WERA 2019 Focal Meeting will consist of a program of paper and symposia sessions on topics of worldwide scope. In general, the WERA Focal Meeting seeks to feature research that includes more than one country or is comparative, cross-cultural, international, or transnational in conceptualization, scope, or design.

## Publications of the WERA-IRN Extended Education

Extended Education from an International Comparative Point of View (Conference Volume)

An edited volume of 13 contributions of the 2017 conference, *Extended Education from an International Comparative Point of View*, which took place in Bamberg, Germany, will be published by Springer in summer 2019.

The volume contains recent research about developments of extended education, its compensatory effects, and multiprofessional collaboration of staff and peer relations within the field of extended education. Moreover, there is a focus on the situation of extended education in Germany.

# Extracurricular Education of Children in Russia: Unified and Diverse (in Russian only)

Over the past decades, the authors have studied the system development of extracurricular activities in Russia. Their results are presented in this volume and include all key aspects of extracurricular education: its structure, infrastructure, program content, funding approaches and human resources, development vectors and barriers, plus family expectations and strategies, including both territorial and socio-economic context. There is a special focus on the availability of services and the equality of educational opportunities. The volume is available in Russian only, but an English summary is currently prepared.

The study was conducted under the leadership of Sergey Kosaretsky and Isak Frumin, and published by the Institute of Education of the Higher School of Economics in Moscow, Russia.

## New Research Project

Effects of organized leisure activities on the transition into vocational training. Longitudinal study among middle and lower secondary school pupils

Karen Hemming of the German Youth Institute and member of our network, started a new project on effects of organized leisure activities on the transition into vocational training. The quantitative longitudinal survey aims at analyzing positive effects of organized leisure activities on work related personal and social resources as well as on the transition into vocational training among youth at the end of their lower/middle secondary school career in Germany. Further objectives are identifying leisure types and analyzing selective effects of sociodemographic background indicators on the usage of organized leisure activities. The 4-year study is funded by the German Research Foundation (DFG). Read more.

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#### **Former Activities**



Symposium at the AERA Annual Meeting: Afterschool Programs and their Quality in Different Countries around the World

Prof. Marianne Schuepbach and Prof. Ludwig Stecher organized this symposium. It consisted of a presentation of five papers concerning afterschool programs and their quality in different countries, followed by a discussion on staff professionalism as basis of the educational quality of extended education programs.

The first paper aimed to clarify the nature of afterschool programs in Japan based on data from nationwide surveys, and was presented by Prof. Fuyuko Kanefuji, Bunkyo University, Japan. Prof. Marianne Schuepbach, Freie Universität Berlin, examined activities and their quality in all-day schools in Switzerland. Prof. Gil Noam, Rebecca K. Browne and Dr. Patricia Allen, Harvard University and The PEAR Institute, presented a U.S. study on supporting science, technology, engineering, and maths (STEM) in after-school. The paper from Sweden by Prof. Anna-Lena Ljusberg, Stockholm University, Sweden, focused on the training for teachers working in extracurricular activities. The last presentation compared the involvement of teachers in extracurricular activities at their school on an international level. It was held by Dr. Stephan Kielblock, Leibnitz Institute for Research and Information in Education and Prof. Ludwig Stecher, University, Sweden.

We enjoyed the active participation in our symposium and were glad to connect with the Out-of-School Time SIG 160 of the AERA!
